Overview:

Digital Design explores the basic concepts of Art (Creativity/Critical Thinking and the Principles of Design) in a digital format. Students will be introduced to and become familiar with popular digital software like Photoshop and Illustrator. Students will also learn digital citizenship in terms of protecting the rights of other artists' work as well as their own. Through classroom critiques and online sharing, students will learn how to express and accept criticism and praise. In addition to that, classroom critiques and the exploration of other artists' work will allow the students to identify their own tastes in art and, therein, begin to develop their own style.

Being creative is a highly sought after skill in a number of fields. Students in this class will learn creative thinking techniques as well as how to apply them to 'real world' challenges.

Projects for this class are:

- designed to allow students to practice and become comfortable with the tools within each program.
- designed to introduce 'real world' applications such as logo designs, posters, brochures and more.
- designed to push each student's ability to successfully communicate a message, whether for a client or for personal expression.
- designed to elevate each student's creative thinking skills.

Students are expected to use this site, either at home or in school, to complete any missed work or review any missed videos or slideshows.

Supplies to consider. While purchasing is not necessary, you may want to borrow a few items to make your digital work easier.

- Headphones for listening to video tutorials in class.
- Download Photoshop and/or Illustrator from the Adobe site (you can do this for free, without needing a credit card for a seven day trial) when absolutely necessary.

Extras (nice, but not needed)

• Internet access at home. While this is not always possible, it makes keeping up with your assignments much easier. If internet is not available at home, identifying a separate location, outside of school hours is greatly encouraged. (Locations with free Wifi, the library, friends/family, etc.)

Grading

Online Journal: Journal prompts and image searches will be completed on a Google Doc shared with Mrs. Jones. Completion of each entry will be graded according to contribution of thought and effort as well as accuracy.

Assignments: Assignments are created in order to learn and practice new techniques. Credit is given according to the accuracy of the techniques in question. Following directions is a key skill here.

Projects will be graded according to key concepts of design or techniques found in a rubric specific to each project. Creativity and Craftsmanship are a factor in each rubric as well. A final project that uses all of the skills taught within each program will comprise the final exam for each semester.

Weekly or bi-weekly progress reports will be sent on Friday afternoons. If an assignment is missing or marked zero, the assignment can be made up at any time before grades are due for the report card of that marking period. There is no penalty for missing work/late work, however, completing assignments in a timely manner while the information is still fresh is a key to success.
